The Ames High Alumni Association is very happy to award three \$500 scholarships to Ames High seniors. This is the fourth year for awarding the AHAA Scholarship to a student who exemplifies the best in an all around Ames High graduate. Karen Hsu is this year's recipient.

This is the first year for awarding an AHAA Memorial Scholarship to an Ames High senior who is at least a second generation Ames High graduate. The memorial scholarships will be funded through memorial contributions to the AHAA and the amount of contributions given will determine the number of memorial scholarships to be awarded. Jana Hertz and Crystal Houge will receive scholarships this year.

Congratulations to Karen, Jana and Crystal and thank-you to all who contributed to the AHAA to make these scholarships possible.

Karen Hsu has won regional and national awards in science and journalism, is active in student council, orchestra, marching band, modern dance, and Ames High Volunteers. She is editor of the Spirit, a reporter for the Web and co-chair of Ames High's Human Relations Commit-

tee. Karen will attend the University of Missouri-Columbia majoring in Broadcast Journalism.

Jana Hertz has displayed superb musical talent earning State Division I ratings as a flutist, pianist and in the Vocal Large Group contest. She is also involved in student council, track, volleyball and theater. Phonathon Benefits Ames High

A phonathon was conducted by the Ames Education Foundation on Sunday, April 18 with the goal of raising \$4500 to be used to purchase a portable sound system for Ames High School. Almost 2500 Ames High Alums in the Ames area were contacted by mail and then more than 700 phone calls were made by volunteers asking alums for contributions to the project. Over \$3000 were raised from the day's calls and hopefully the additional dollars needed will be received from the alumni and other Ames High supporters.

Ames High School's top priority on its "wish list" for a long time has been a portable sound system to be used at assemblies, dances, banquets, and athletic events. Currently, the school rents a system whenever needed. The AHAA was pleased to endorse this beneficial project.

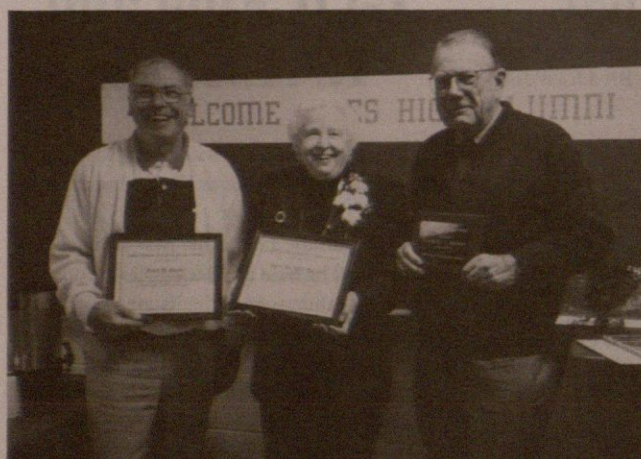

The fact that class member David Rex is the Chief Engineer of this craft made planning so much easier.

Those attending from Class of '55 recommend a cruise like this as a marvelously relaxing, different type of class gathering, not to mention it being relatively inexpensive travel at its best. So much wonderful time to visit and make new class friends years after graduation!

ment, while passing by an endless array of natural, recreational, residential, municipal, and industrial sights on both the Iowa and Illinois sides of the river. Of particular interest are the different island configurations, varied river traffic, waiting your turn at the Dams & Locks before passing through, the water birds and other wildlife.

Riverboat passengers spend the night at the Chestnut Mountain Lodge (a ski resort in winter) located high above the Mississippi. The evening's entertainment by a singing comic will be long remembered. Sunday morning before starting the return boat trip, the group is bussed into the quaint, restored town of Galena, Ill. for sightseeing and shopping.

As the trip drew to a close, with lots of posing for what turned out to be good group photos, the temptation was great to make the cruise an annual event or to offer it again soon. Everyone was relieved to learn later in the summer that "The Julia" and her sister boat "Twilight" would be staying on the Mississippi instead of being transferred to the Tennessee River.

As well as staging full-scale reunions in 1970, 1980, 1985 and 1990, the Class first celebrated a significant birthday in 1987 (the big 5-0). That party was a three-day affair in Ames over the 4th of July. The next regularly scheduled reunion is expected in 1995 in Ames, but hopefully a new and exciting adventure will also be in store in 1997 (the big 6-0). Next AHS Principal Hired

Charles Achter from Chaska, Minnesota will become the next principal of Ames High School starting July 1. He was principal of Chaska High School for 16 years. Chaska is a suburb of Minneapolis. Achter succeeds current Principal Ralph Farrar who will become the school District's assistant superintendent.

"I'm real humbled by the whole thing," Achter said. "It's really a humbling experience to come through the search that they did and be the person that was chosen."

Howard Shapiro, School Board President, said "I'm real excited about him coming. He's going to be a really great fit for Ames High. He seems to have administrative ability to get a high school really moving in the direction of looking at outcomes for kids and making sure they're all achieving as much as possible."

Students and Teachers Recognized

Ames High Seniors Kim Windom and Morris Liao were honored by the Connie Belin National Center for Gifted Education at the University of Iowa for receiving perfect scores on P/ACT subjects.

Each winner was able to pick a teacher who had been the most influential and significant to them. Liao named Ames High science teacher Bob Gibbons. Windom chose Ames High English teacher LoAnn Campbell. Students and teachers from across the nation were recognized at a ceremony at the Memorial Union on the campus of the University of Iowa.

Debating Pays Off

Amy Gardner, an Ames High School senior, won the state and regional contests in the American Legion National High School Oratorical Contest. She received \$6,000 for college expenses and she hopes to attend Luther College in Decorah, Ia. this fall. She is the first Ames student to win the state contest.

The American Legion Contest requires participants to prepare an eight to ten minute memorized speech dealing with the Constitution. Gardner spoke about the obligation to vote. She won the state contest in March and a four-state regional contest in April. Two days later she traveled to the sectional contest in Kansas. Her parents, friends, and Coach Marvin Scott were there for support. She said she hopes her experience will encourage others to enter the competition.

10 years ago (1983)...Musical Sailed After Five Years

This year the Ames High drama department set afloat a new production. They presented the musical *South Pacific*, by Rodgers & Hammerstein. Musicals weren't totally new to Ames High. They used to be done every three years. However, it had been five years since Ames High produced a musical. Chip Wass, a senior who played Colonel Brachet, said, "They were going to do a musical my sophomore year, but not enough people tried out."

25 years ago (1968)...Largest GRA in history.

One third of the Ames High girls joined to make this year's GRA the largest in the history of the organization. The girls participated in basketball, volleyball, bowling and softball tournaments throughout the year, and traveled to watch the Iowa girls' basketball tournament in Des Moines. In addition, the ever popular GRA tee-shirt sales reached an all-time high.

50 years ago (1943)...Skyscrapers

With three different mentors at the helm, Ames High's cage crew battled through the 1942-1943 basketball season to capture 12 victories in a 21 game schedule. Coach Kenneth Wells departed for the Navy after the opening game and Ray Smalling led the team until the opening of the district tournament at which time he too set sail for naval training. Coach Ritland ably directed the team for the remainder of the season. Not only did the cagers lose two of their coaches to the armed forces, but they also lost the services of their stellar guard, Jim Sutherland, who left for duties at an air corps meteorology school midway in the season.

75 years ago (1918)...Popularity Contest a Huge Success

Dorothy McCarroll, Beatrice Olson, and Lucille Long were the winners in the Spirit Popularity Contest. Among these three girls there is no ranking given, as this was understood as one of the restrictions placed on the contest. However, it seems that everyone in high school has decided just how the vote stood. Who the mind reader is has not yet been found out. AHS Athletic Hall of Fame

Two former coaches and nine athletes have been elected to the Ames High School Athletic Hall of Fame, according to athletic director Dave Posegate.

In reviewing the credentials of over 80 nominees (from a list that currently numbers over 300), the hall of fame jury elected former coaches Ray Donels and Ray Smalling, along with athletes Richard Cole (1927), Larry Owens (1936), Dick Bliss (1940), Max Sowers (1947), Jack Wolf (1955), Ben Fellows (1958), Bob Reinbold (1973), Susan Deppe (1975), and Chuck Harmison (1976).

The 11 individuals will be presented and honored at induction ceremonies in Ames on Thursday, October 28. Tickets for the event will be on sale to the public in September.

In addition the group will be honored at a school pep assembly on Friday, October 29, the football game that evening and will be guests of the athletic department at the Boys' and Girls' State Cross Country Championships, Saturday, October 30.

The new inductees are the second class to receive the highest honor, the athletic department can bestow upon a former coach or athlete. Criteria for the election of athletes is primarily their high school achievements and contributions to Ames High athletics. They are not eligible until they have been graduated 10 years. Coaches will be considered after having been "retired" from coaching the sport(s) in which they are nominated. Prime consideration is given to the achievements of their teams and athletes and their overall contribution and service to Ames High School.

Houses for the Birds

For David Stucky '68, creativity isn't a hobby, it's a lifestyle.

His latest creations have captured the interest of gardeners, folk art collectors and galleries around the nation.

Stucky now lives in Hunterdon, N.J.

After leaving Ames, Stucky traveled though-out the United States, graduated from the Brooks Institute of Photography, owned and managed a gallery in New York City, and worked as a professional photographer.

He said those experiences have contributed to his newest creative interest: designing and building folk art bird houses.

Each bird house is a one-of-a-kind design, built from antique wood and built to be used. Stucky said he wanted to build bird houses that were aesthetically pleasing, practical and sturdy.

"I've always been a carpenter and made things, and I've always been artistic, and this was sort of a combination of the creative eye and my love for making things," Stucky said.

The bottom of the bird houses are signed and carry this proclamation, "The Finest Made. Period." some of the bird houses have slogans hammered out on small tin signs. One sign states, "Times ain't bad, till no bird sings."

Stucky said he stumbled on the idea after a series of events, including the stock market crash of 1987, which led to his move to the New Jersey countryside.

After buying a New Jersey home built in 1830, Stucky began work to renovate and restore the post-and-beam home. As he worked to renovate his home, he noticed that developers were destroying other historic homes and agricultural buildings in the area.

Stucky joined the historical society to save some of the historical buildings in the area. If a building couldn't be saved, he would try to salvage materials from the building before it was destroyed.

Stucky, who's an avid gardener, began using the salvaged wood and copper to build projects for his garden. First he built a copper wind vane from a piece of the salvaged material to accent his flower garden. After that he began building bird houses for the garden and thought he'd try to sell them.

A year ago, Stucky took a piece of his work to a local shop that specialized in American folk art.

Today, Stucky has several interested buyers in the bird houses. He said he enjoys building and designing the bird houses and said it's part of a life-long pursuit to explore creative avenues.

"I'd say the three main things I'll always be doing something with—is photography, writing and folk art."

Stucky said building the bird houses taught him to focus his energy on doing the things he enjoys.

"It's as simple and as difficult as just doing it. That's the bottom line. Do you know how many times you say to yourself, 'Well, I should do this' and it just never seems to get done? I mean that happens a lot in peoples' lives. I've done it myself countless times."

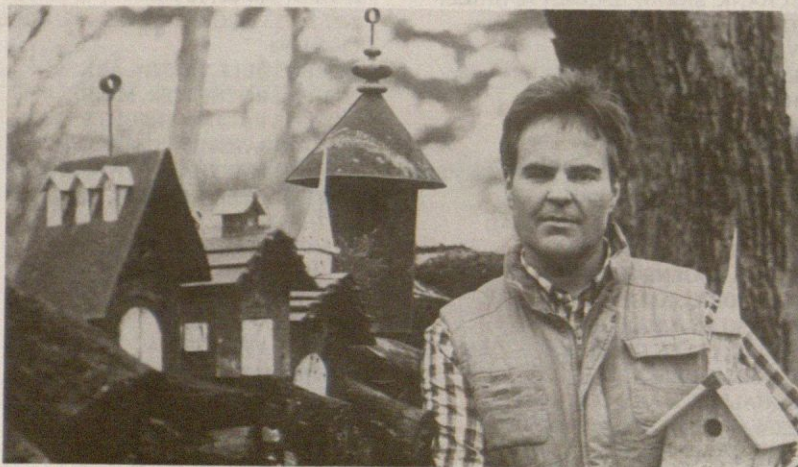
