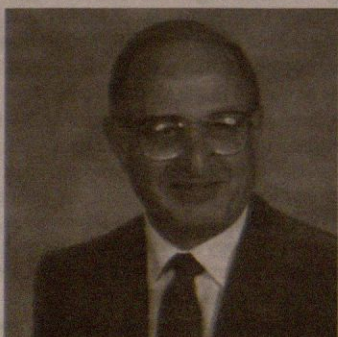

Bill Ripp retires after 37 years at AHS

When the July 31 work day ends, Associate Principal William C. Ripp will officially walk out the doors of Ames High for the last time. But the 36-year love affair he has nurtured with the school, staff, students, and community won't be severed. It will simply take on a new dimension. At 59, Ripp is taking an "early retirement."

Ripp came to Ames in 1959. He's a native of Amherst, NE and has degrees in Latin, English and philosophy. During his first seven years at AHS, Ripp taught four classes of Latin and one of English plus two classes each summer. He was involved with Student Council and Senior Senate. In 1966 he became the director of guidance and in 1970 became associate principal.

As Senior Senate sponsor for 30 years, he's had the opportunity to personally know most graduates. When the Class of 1995 receives its diplomas, he will have seen the graduation of 12,770 students -- nearly 66 percent of the school's total. His recognition of alumni is remarkable. He has remained active in the planning of class reunions and giving tours.

In 1988 Ripp began organizing the Ames

High Alumni Association. For his work at AHS and with the Alumni Association, the AHAA named him the first Honorary Alumnus in 1990.

"I have had the opportunity to work in the finest educational institution of its kind in the United States. The support we receive from parents and the community is phenomenal. It has allowed a dedicated staff and great students to meet high expectations. Jane and I could not have selected a better place to raise our family," said Ripp.

The Rippes have raised five AHS alumni: Kritin '81, Camille '83, Michael '87, Michelle '88, and Renee '92.

What does the future hold for Mr. Ripp? "I will continue working with the alumni association and my hobbies of woodworking and gardening. I will do some volunteer work in the community, catch up on my fishing, continue to spoil my grandchildren, and do things for my children and grandchildren," said Ripp.

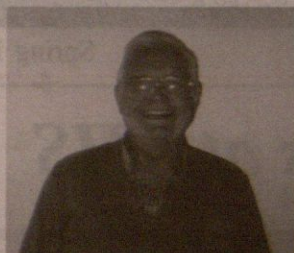

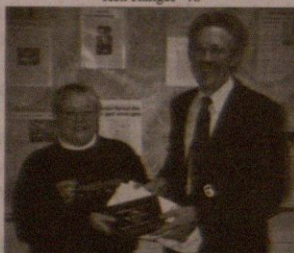

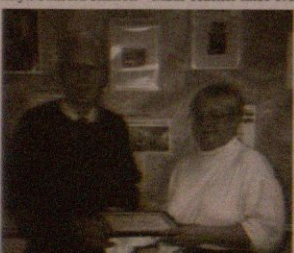

The 5th annual Ames High Alumni Jamboree was held February 17 at Ames High School. Kenneth Hanger '46 was named the 1995 AHAA Favorite Alum, and Marilyn Stafford Hanson and Richard Trump were named honorary alums. Rose (Baldus) Kelso presented the awards.

Kenneth H. Hanger is a 1946 graduate of Ames High School. Following graduation he attended Northwestern University in Evanston, Illinois where he earned a degree in finance. After graduating, Ken worked for several corporations before establishing his own investment corporation in 1955.

Recognizing the consequences of the Vietnam War, Ken concentrated on foreign currencies, financial instruments, and other commodities. Although Ken is semi-retired and his daughter runs the corporation for him, he still goes to the office on a regular basis and trades.

Ken was married in 1950. He and his wife have four children and eight grandchildren. When Ken established his business in 1955, his wife handled the books and telephone from the kitchen table.

In appreciation and recognition of Ames High School, Ken established the Hanger Scholarship, a four-year renewable scholarship, in 1983. To date twelve Ames High School graduating seniors have been recipients.

Ken currently resides in Gaithersburg, Maryland. He says that he still looks forward to every day. Reading and working out to keep in shape are his main personal interests, and he tries to do each every day.

Marilyn Stafford Hanson began teaching math at AHS in 1959. She currently serves as mathematics department coordinator. She has co-sponsored Girl Reserves, served on numerous AHS and district committees, co-chaired the last North Central Association evaluation of Ames

High, and been active in many professional organizations.

A native of Des Moines County, Mrs. Hanson is a 1955 graduate of Burlington High School. She received an A.A. degree from Burlington Junior College in 1957, a B.S. degree from the University of Northern Iowa in 1959 and a M.S. degree from the University of Iowa in 1963. She has taken additional graduate courses at Drake University, Iowa State University and the University of Iowa.

Never too busy to help students or to encourage them to pursue a career in mathematics, she has been named staff person of the month twice by the students.

Richard Trump is a native of Keokuk who enjoyed a Mark Twain boyhood on the Mississippi River. After graduation from Keokuk High School in 1930 he enrolled at Iowa State College and received a B.S. degree in 1936 and M.S. in 1943.

Mr. Trump went back to Keokuk and taught science for seven years at his high school before joining the Ames High staff in 1943. His first year at Ames High School he coached boys' golf finishing second in the state. His teaching career was interrupted for two years during World War II while he served in the United States Navy.

Following the war he returned to AHS where he continued to teach biology. In addition to his teaching responsibilities Mr. Trump served as faculty advisor to the yearbook staff for ten years, served on building and district committees, co-authored two biology books, was a master at photography and research, and became an expert on woodchucks, bees, and honey.

Mr. Trump retired from Ames High School in 1977. Following his retirement Mr. Trump taught entomology at Iowa State University for ten years.

Lia Pierson — Rhodes Scholar

Lia Pierson '92 continues to distinguish herself after leaving Ames High School. In December Lia, an Iowa State University senior, learned that she had been chosen a 1995 Rhodes scholar. Pierson will probably leave ISU with a 3.99 grade-point average (her downfall: an A-minus in biochemistry). But among Rhodes applicants, terrific GPA's are common. Pierson will cross the Atlantic not because she is a brain, but because she is a brain that embodies all that has come to be associated with the moniker "Rhodie."

She is a Renaissance woman. In May she will receive a chemical engineering degree with a minor in biochemistry. She is an Iowa prep champion sprinter who earned a full athletic scholarship and has competed ably against Big Eight Conference competition. She began playing the violin at age 6 and later picked up the French horn. She continues weekly violin lessons at Iowa State, where her instructor calls her one of his top students.

I don't see how there could've been a more logical (Rhodes scholar) choice than Lia," said chemical engineering professor Richard Seagrave, an admittedly biased observer who recruited Pierson to ISU and served as her advisor.

"As long as I've known her," added John Forssman, Pierson's English instructor at Ames High School, "she has approached everything she did as a new area that was going to add something to her life."

Her Rhodes class of 32 includes six Harvard students, but



Pierson does not apologize for her Midwestern, land-grant roots. The angular 23 year-old's eyes roll toward the ceiling when she learns that more than one observer has called her a Renaissance figure. A woman who explains her Rhodes selection by shrugging and saying, "I guess I do a bunch of different things pretty well."

Her intense track workouts recharge her zest for academic work. Yet, when a stress fracture forced her to sit out part of her freshman season it was her

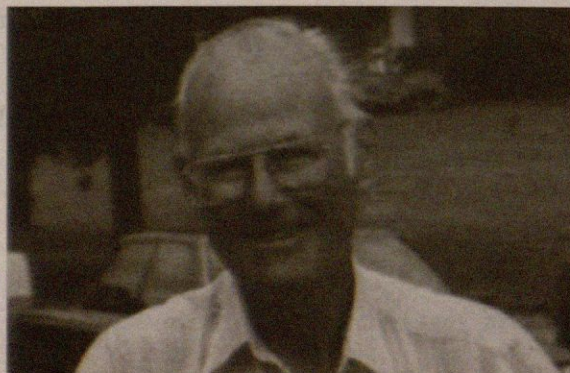
class work and music that blunted the pain.

Pierson, who admits, I'm not real good at snap decisions because I like to study all the angles," agonized so long over informing Oxford of her chosen field of study that she had to express mail her papers. She opted for physiological sciences, though she hasn't taken a single biology course at Iowa State.

While she once planned on working in the environmental arena, she now leans toward following her brother into medicine.

Noel Taylor — Biking 4,800 Miles



When "Iowa Boy" Chuck Offenburger put out the call for bicycling enthusiasts to join him for a three-month "Odyssey across America," Ames High graduate **Noel Taylor '35** was quick to answer the call.

Taylor rode a bicycle as a child, like most boys and girls do. Then he outgrew bicycling as a teen and didn't have the urge to go back to two-wheelers until he retired. Taylor, 78, retired from the Prudential Insurance Company in 1978 and soon took up bicycling as a hobby.

"It was just something to do after I retired," Taylor said. Since 1978, he has participated in RAGBRAI 12 times and has ridden to

West Lafayette, Ind., for the Methodist men's quadrennial meeting. Other rides include a solo trip from Denver, CO, to Grinnell and a ride from Grinnell to Walker, MN to attend the Walker Reunion sponsored by the Ames High Alumni Association.

Now, Taylor hopes to join Offenburger and up to 300 others for "Iowa 150 Ride/A Sesquicentennial Expedition." Currently, Taylor is the oldest rider to sign-up.

The route for the ride begins in Long Beach, CA, and runs through San Francisco, Yellowstone National Park, and Mt. Rushmore. Then the ride merges with RAGBRAI at its starting point along Iowa's western boarder. The route dips south to Nashville, TN, before heading north to Gettysburg, PA. The ride winding up in Washington D.C.

In order to prepare for the strenuous 4,800 mile ride, Taylor has been working out at the Grinnell College Physical Education Complex. During the spring, summer, and fall months Taylor makes regular rides in the Poweshiek-Jasper County area.

According to Taylor the main concern is not his physical stamina, it is financial support. The AHS grad must commit \$3,000 by June 1 in order to be eligible for the trip.

One of my big jobs right now is getting enough sponsors to go because I don't have enough money to go by myself," Taylor said.

What Taylor hopes is that area residents and/or business will sign-up to sponsor a certain number of miles. The average donor sponsors 10 to 25 miles. Of the 4,800 miles of the trip, Taylor has secured sponsors for nearly 2,800 miles leaving just 2,000 miles yet to cover.

Jerry Bowen '65

Jerry Bowen is a CBS Reporter and goes to all corners of the world. He was born in Atlantic, and grew up there and in Centerville, Fairfield, and Ames. Jerry started college at Iowa State where he broke into TV news at WOI.

He landed a summer job while in college reporting for WCCO-TV in Minneapolis and wound up staying, eventually graduating in journalism from the University of Minnesota.

While there he met and married his wife Val, and they now have two sons, Nathan, 18, and Spencer, 14.

Jerry's career with CBS began in the Chicago bureau in 1977, and within six months he was reassigned to the European bureau in Rome.

"I was 29 years old then, and it was a tremendous opportunity to see the world at someone else's expense," he said. "Besides that, it turned into one exciting news time with the death of the popes and the Shah being driven out of power in Iran.

There were some close calls for him in Iran, where he and a film crew "were put in prison for a few hours because, typical of Western reporters, we pushed too hard and too far in our coverage and broke the rules Khomeini's people had set for us."

Jerry was reassigned to Los Angeles in 1979 to cover the Reagan campaign, and decided to stay there reporting for the "CBS Evening News" until late 1991. He backed Ed Bradley in a short-lived magazine show, "Street Stories," then joined "CBS Sunday Morning" in 1993. Jerry is still reporting for the show and also the nightly news.

Jerry said "there was a period when I was kind of on the outs for a while as far as working for the "Evening News" because I didn't fit somebody's idea of what the "flavor of the month" should be.

"Image is such a big thing in TV news. There was a time where if you weren't young and if you weren't striking-looking on camera, you kind of went on the shelf.

"But now I've been taken back into good favor. They seem to have decided some of us old guys are pretty good after all."

Charles Schaefer '38

Charles Schaefer was recently selected to be inducted into the Colorado Amateur Softball Association's Hall of Honor. The induction ceremony was held on March 18 in Northglenn, Colorado.

Schaefer attended Iowa State College after graduating from AHS and graduated in 1941. He then joined the United States Army, where he served for 30 years.

Jon Aitchison '82

Jon Aitchison is actively involved in the theatrical scene in Washington, D.C. He is the wigmaster for the Arena State, one of that city's most reputable professional theaters. Jon just finished wiggling Ibsen's "Hedda Gabler" for the company. Most of the Arena's wigs are built from scratch and made from human hair. Jon is also responsible for the Carrie Chapman Catt wig in "The Yellow Rose of Suffrage."

Louis Thompson '56

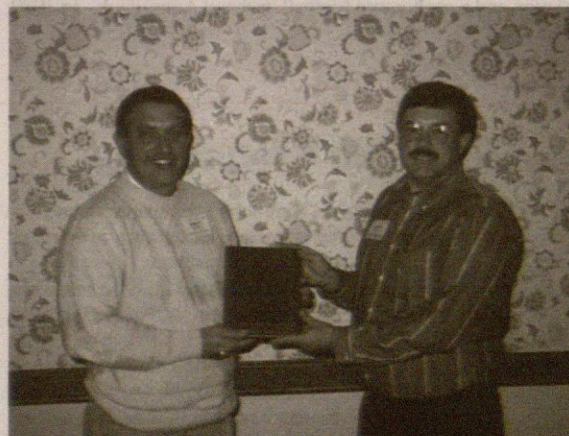
Louis M. Thompson, Jr. was appointed chief executive officer of the National Investor Relations Institute in Vienna, Virginia. Thompson currently is President and CEO of NIRI.

NIRI is an international professional organization of more than 2,500 corporate executive and investor relations consultants responsible for communication between corporate management and financial publics.

As head of the NIRI professional staff, Thompson is responsible for the operations of NIRI and is a member of the NIRI Board of Directors. Thompson is also a member of the U.S. Securities and Exchange Commission's (SEC) Consumer Affairs Committee and also serves as a member of New Foundations, a group of experts formed under the John F. Kennedy School of Government at Harvard University to develop new ideas and approaches to the issue of corporate governance.

In 1974, Thompson resigned his commission as a major in the U.S. Army to become Assistant White House Press Secretary for President Gerald R. Ford. He had served in key public affairs positions in Vietnam and Pentagon where he was the Military Assistant to the Assistant Secretary of Defense for Public Affairs from 1971-1974.

Bill Case '68



Bill Case was recognized as "PA of the Year" for the State of Iowa by the Iowa Physician Assistant Society at their annual fall conference.

Case was presented the award because of his outstanding contribution to the PA profession in Iowa. His contributions include his work in PA education at the University of Osteopathic Medicine and Health Sciences in Des Moines, his service on the Board of Directors of the PA Society, and his past year at President-elect of the Society.

Duea Inducted into IATC Hall of Fame

The girls' track program at Ames High is one of the best in the state, and now the teams' coach is being recognized for making it that way.

Jim Duea has been inducted into the Iowa Association of Track Coaches Hall of Fame.

"I think as a coach it is particularly meaningful when you realize that the group you're being considered a part of has had such a significant impact on the sport that you truly love," Duea said. "I think that means an awful lot."

Duea began his coaching career at Humboldt High School in 1960 where he was a junior high football and assistant varsity boys' track coach. In 1962, Duea started the cross country program and became the head boys' track coach in 1967.

In 1971, Duea became an assistant track coach under John Sletten and a sophomore football coach at Ames High. In 1980,

Duea became the girls' track coach at Ames, a position he has held ever since.

Under Duea, the Little Cyclones have won three state girls outdoor championships (1987, 1988, 1992) and two state girls indoor championships (1989, 1990).

Ames was the state outdoor runner-up last year, and was third on three occasions. The Little Cyclones have won 12 conference meets, and finished second three times.

They have been district champions nine times, and remained undefeated in all meets except the state meet since the first outdoor invitational meet in 1987, a span of nearly eight seasons.

"I have been very lucky to have coached in Humboldt and Ames," Duea said. "Those two communities have strongly supported track. It's certainly a positive reflection on where you've been, not just who you are. Accomplishments as a coach aren't really yours."

"They're the accomplishments of the people you've worked with - your kids, your athletes and your coaches. I see it really as a compliment to the places where I've coached and it's a compliment to the kids I've coached and a compliment to the coaches I've worked with."

"He's done a tremendous job with our girls' track program, and of course, he's involved in other programs," Ames Athletic Director Dave Posegate said. "It seems that every program Jim is involved in turns out to be a winner."

"One of the keys to Jim's success is that he gets so many kids out and gets them all involved in some level of competition and they all seem to have that team concept, and I think those are a couple reasons why he's successful."

Duea is the ninth person from Ames to be inducted into the Hall of Fame. He joins Hi Covey (inducted in 1972), Harry Burrell (1976), George Brettnall (1977), Cecil Spatcher (1977), Cliff Cushman (1979), Orville Madsen (1981), Bill Bergan (1984), and John Sletten (1991).

"It's special because the selection committee that recommended the group, they're really your peers, so it is special in that sense," Duea said.

The Web's Beginning

The origin of the the Ames High School newspaper's name, The Web, has always been shrouded in mystery, locked away in the minds of the 1920's graduates.

Theories vary from the name of a printing press, the "web" perfecting press, to a suggestion that items are caught in a network of reporters' threads.

One of the people who knows where the name came from is the man who actually named the Web, Lynn Richardson '29. He entered the name in a contest and came away with a \$2 prize.

Richardson was manager of field operations at the Iowa State Center for Industrial Research and Service before retiring. He explained that he intended the name to mean "to hold together." He passed away November 11, 1994 in Bella Vista, Arkansas.

During the early years of the Web students paid a subscription fee for the paper which consisted of one or two mimeographed pages. No one remembers when, the subscription was dropped, and today the Web is distributed biweekly at Ames High as well as in the Ames Daily Tribune.

Third Annual Hockey Game Played

Seven AHS Students Named as National Merit Finalist.

National merit finalists have been named. Ames High boasts seven of them including Ruby Hsu, Karen Moon, Matthew Prins, Andrew Proescholdt, Farhang Raaii and Jennifer Sippel. Senior Misi Emiola is a National Achievement Scholarship finalist.

AHS Wins Second Straight Regional Science Bowl.

For the second straight year, Ames High School grabbed top honors in the regional science bowl qualifying them to participate in the national competition in Washington D.C. AHS beat second-place Stoughton (Wisconsin) High School by a score of 76-40. There were 33 teams in the competition sponsored by the U.S. Department of Energy.

The AHS team consisting of seniors Mike Choi, Farhang Raaii, and Tami Shinar and juniors Dion Harmon and Dau Johnston beat 36 other high schools from Iowa and Wisconsin.

Boys' Swim Team Finishes Second in State Meet
