# 1945 BASKETBALL CHAMPIONSHIP REUNION

Ten members of the 1945 Ames High basketball team met in Ames to commemorate winning the state basketball championship of 50 years ago. This reunion consisted of a weekend of activities, highlighted by a team introduction on the floor during half time ceremonies at the 1995 state basketball finals at Veterans Auditorium in Des Moines on March 18.

Team members and spouses gathered at Jim and Margie Buck's home in Ames on Friday afternoon to enjoy beverages and goodies while re-establishing old ties, discussing events of the intervening years and recalling many memories of the glorious past. Following a great meal at the Broiler, each member had an opportunity to make appropriate remarks. The absences of deceased members, coaches Ole Tiller, and Hi Covey and players Jerry Galvin and Mal Schmidt, were respectfully noted. They were deeply missed.

Out of town members were given tours of Ames on Saturday morning, including the old Ames High School building (now Ames City Hall).

The following is an excerpt from a column by the Iowa Boy, Chuck Offenburger, in the March 21, 1995, Des Moines Register, which best captured the feelings on the floor that Saturday evening.

#### "What it means to win state

There was a moment Saturday night at Veterans Memorial Auditorium in Des Moines when it became clear what a wonderful thing a state championship in high school basketball really is. I bring this up now especially for the lads from Winfield-Mount Union, Osage, Johnston and Ankeny who won the state titles in four classes over the weekend. Few if any of them would have seen the special moment I'm referring to here.

It was at half time of the Class 4.4 cares.

It was at half time of the Class 4-A game. The new Hall of Famers and other special award recipients had all been recognized and the ceremonies seemed to be over. But then 10 older fellows, all nicely dressed in suits and sports jackets, walked out to the east free throw line.

Mo Kelley, the spokesman for the Iowa High School Athletic Association, used the microphone to introduce them as a group of former Ames High basketball players who were back together for a first-ever team reunion. Now coming from six states were Dr. Jim Buck, Stan Delahunt, George Duvall, John Fenley, Bud Gibbs, Bruce Holl, Rollie Knight, Dave Maney, Paul Sjurson and Max Sowers.

When Kelley got to the line that this was the 1945 Ames High team "winners of the state championship 50 years ago right now," the fans in Vets gave them a tremendous ovation.

The 10 old players, all now in their 60's suddenly began throwing fists into the air, clapping each other on the back and waving to the crowd, saluting something that's evidently just as sweet a half-century later as the night it happened. Maybe sweeter.

"None of us anticipated there'd be that kind of crowd reaction," George Duvall said. "It sure triggered a lot of memories for us."

Maybe especially so for him. Duvall became a basketball coach at his alma mater and led the Ames boys to another state championship in 1973."

Yes it was even sweeter and the memories were great!


The second flight was won by Joe Grant, '74, Ben Svec, '74, and John Grant, '83, and Mike Cyr, '77 with a 69.

#### 1935 Golf

In April, 1934, Ames High school started its first interscholastic golf team. Not much interest was shown in golf by the school body and there were only eight boys out for the team. Practice was carried out at Homewood Golf Course, and the home matches were played at the Golf and Country Club.

The boys who participated in practice and matches throughout the year were Jim Ash, Junior Vifquain, Bob Duckworth, Bob Schreiber, Wendell Allan, Frank Snyder, Dell Pierson, and Jack Stouder.

#### 1946 Junior Executive Council

This was a banner year for the eleventh grade of 1945-46 at the beginning of the atomic age. One of the first events of the year was the Hi-Y junior fireside at Lynn Fuhrer Lodge. As usual, not many had thought to bring flashlights, so the gauntlet of ruts, gully-edged twists in the path, and brushes with ambushing early-comers had to be run in darkness. Still, it was worth bearing the pitfalls of the trip to hear Mr. Willis' humorous talk of pitfalls of a more abstract sense - the shortcomings of love.

The last and most important social event on the school calendar was the Junior-Senior Frolic arranged by the juniors for the graduates. Because a movie was included besides dancing as entertainment, the stag line probably was not as long this year as formerly.

In general, this year was not so much different from any other junior year. Neither the war nor the war's end had changed the fundamental class spirit which will continue as long as there is an Ames High.

# 1967 - Vocal Music Groups Attract 133 Student Singers

The vocal music department under the direction of Mr. Al Wiser, was made up of several large singing groups including the choir, mixed chorus, and girls' glee, as well as a few small singing groups such as the madrigal and quartets. Two of these quartets made All-State and were asked to perform at various functions several times during the year. The vocal music department gave two public concerts this year. They also gave several private performances such as singing for the Women's Club at Christmas.

A couple highlights of the year were:

Under the guidance of Bill Riley, A Cappella Choir was filmed for a TV sequence on "The Mike Douglas Show."

The lobby was one of several stopping places for the choir as it caroled to Ames High students and teachers at Christmas Time.

### 1985 - Managers, Trainers Hard Work That Pays Off

### \$5 Million AHS Project Nearing Completion

No one at Ames High School has won the Iowa lottery yet, but students are reaping the benefits of a 1993 bond referendum, which also targeted improvements at the Ames Middle School.

Over \$5 million has been used to finance the addition of a new media center, eight science classrooms, an art classroom and renovations of former science rooms, media center, outer administrative area, and rest rooms.

Eighty-five percent of the building project was completed when classes started for the 1995-96 school year. All new construction was added to the west side of the existing building.

Only the conversion of the former media center on the second floor to six language classrooms remains and that is scheduled for completion in November.

The new media center, is the hub of the new addition. It overlooks the prairie and contains a new 30 station computer lab, two classroom/study areas, a professional library, and offices for media center personnel, extended learning program and the school district's technology office. Expanded research, display and study areas, and a new security system are also included. Adjacent to the new media center is a multiple purpose room, which is also utilized for district and school board meetings.

The science classrooms and accompanying office space features virtually new equipment. The new art classroom serves a variety of purposes and is near a new darkroom lab that contains 12 stations.

Renovation of six former science classrooms has been completed with the rooms being utilized by mathematics, a new science media center, and special education. Also, undergoing renovations were the rest rooms in the central and north wings. In addition, new doors were placed on all classrooms.

A formal Open House will be held later this year when the construction is competed.

### Four Teachers Retire From AHS

Donna Schepers taught for 26 years at Ames High. She taught all courses in family and consumer science and also taught government. Roger Anderson taught for 38 years, 10 of those at Ames High School. He has been an instrumental music teacher at many of the schools in the Ames system. Ron Bredeson taught for 33 years in the Ames School. He taught general science, earth science, algebra and geometry as well as coached football and wrestling. Jean Dow taught 24 years at Ames High in the art department. Her classes included drawing, 2-D design, 4-D computers and 3-D.

Once reaching the hotline, a caller can access information about everything from the lunch menu to financial aid and scholarships. ### Study Centers

New to Ames High this fall are study centers that replace the large study halls of 60 to 90 students. When ninth and 10th grade students have "study hall" they will have an opportunity to go to one of six study centers, which will be limited to 30 to 35 students each.

The idea behind the concept is to allow students to receive specific subject matter assistance from a teacher or aide in the study center. Students will be able to sign up on a daily basis for their choice of study centers. Each of the study centers is also open to juniors or seniors.

# Ritland stopped teaching, but he'll never stop learning

Ev Ritland, 85, believes that a good education is invaluable. He learned that lesson early from his mother.


"My mother had no formal schooling," he recalls. "But she got a job with a congressman and went to Washington, D.C. and saw the value of education. She was determined that her children would be educated and kept us in school, even in the Depression."

Since 1936, Ritland has been passing on his education to students by becoming a teacher.

This year, he decided to end his career.

Although he retired as acting principal of Ames High School in 1975, Ritland has been substitute teaching ever since then. "It was very irregular, but I loved it," he said. "Especially if I got to teach English or Latin, what I'm best prepared to teach."

But when Ritland received a letter asking him if he wished to continue substituting into the 1996-97 academic year, he replied that he had better quit.

"My memory is not as good as it was," he said. "It's not a particular problem yet, but it could become one."

This concern for his trade is typical of Ritland, who said he had always wanted to teach.

"I have a book from my eighth grade," he recalled. "In it I wrote that I wanted to teach and be a coach."

The inspiration for Ritland's ambition came from his seventh-grade teacher, Robert Rush.

"He was a great athlete and a great teacher. He was a real handsome guy - a real role model."

In an effort to emulate his role model, Ritland went to college and worked hard in the gym.

It was at college that he had his first experience of teaching. An instructing position became available during Ritland's senior year as a Latin major.

"He (the teacher) was canned," said

Ritland. "I was asked to take the class for the rest of the year."

After graduating, Ritland taught in Gilbert for four years and came to Ames when he was called to start a junior high basketball program and to fill in teaching junior and senior high school subjects. From then on, Ritland has been involved in Ames schools, in teaching, coaching and administration.

It really was the most interesting work," he said. "But strangely, because of the Ames people, the kids, and the parents, I felt no pressure. I was rewarded by getting to know all those fine young people."

Although Ritland feels that he was rewarded by his time in the Ames school system, his students and colleagues feel that he gave as much, if not more, back to it.

"He is such a positive individual," said Phil Johnson, a former colleague. "I've known him 30 years and have never heard him say anything negative. He's been a really positive influence on the kids over the years."

Bob Buck, a former student who now is an Ames businessman, agrees. "He was always approachable, friendly and understanding," he said. "We always felt he really liked us as students and had a strong interest in our feelings. He continues that to this day and remembers us all by name."

While Ritland has devoted his life to teaching and education, he has a simple philosophy about what should always be taught in schools to ensure children are well prepared for life. "When I was in school, I spent at least two hours a day in the gym or playing ball," he said. "Latin taught me literacy and communication and sports taught me how to get along with people. That's what you need to know."

The following was received from Noel about his experiences. Congratulations to Noel and it does show that Ames High Aimes High.

We started in Long Beach, CA with a party aboard the Queen Mary on Saturday evening May 26th - went north along the coast to San Francisco then east to Yellowstone Park - Mount Rushmore - on to RAGBRAI the annual bike ride across Iowa sponsored by the Des Moines Register - on to Nashville, TN then northeast through Tennessee, Kentucky, Ohio, and southern Pennsylvania to Gettysburg and south to Washington D.C. ending on Labor Day September 4 just two days before my 79th birthday.
