Four Ames High School seniors each received a \$ 1,500.00 scholarship from the Ames High School Alumni Association at a dinner in their honor on May 3, 2017. The scholarships were based on academic achievement, involvement in school and community activities, volunteerism and financial need. Two of the scholarships were awarded to second-generation graduates from the AHSAA memorial contributions. The other two scholarships were funded from general AHSAA funds and contributions. Congratulations to these outstanding seniors as well as to the entire 2017 graduating class. Since beginning the scholarship program in 1990, thanks to your memberships, contributions and memorials, we have now awarded ninety-five (95) scholarships. You have made a difference in the lives of these Ames High graduates.

Hartley Paige Christensen is the daughter of Chad and Nicole Christensen. Hartley has been active in a variety of activities including: Youth Leadership Ames, Student Council, AHS Key Club, Scratch Pad, the Community Outreach Dance Marathon and the soccer team captain. We Get Letters...

To the AHSAA:

With the accompanying memorial to my father, Donald G. Hartt, I acknowledge my extreme good fortune to have moved to Ames for my high school education from McCallsburg, Iowa, where he had been Superintendent of Schools. He happily ceased being an administrator/ educator to become a teacher. That was 1944. He told me the move was to give me a better education. But also, I know he was frustrated by the rural school boards who could sacrifice quality for economy, preferring to hire bargains among ill-prepared teachers. In Ames, after my father died in 1956, a Donald Hartt Reading Room was created in the old AHS building. Donald Hartt was one of my two most inspirational teachers; in 9th grade algebra he was my beacon in becoming a mathematical physicist.

In Ames, I was swept up by the quality opportunities available to me. I immersed myself, a French Horn player in music, as ably fostered by Richard Day; and also a cappella choir; in mathematics through the inspirational teaching of Mr. Slachert and Mrs. Miller; and tennis, where all my father's coaching (he was tennis coach as well as English teacher--sometimes also physics) could not enable me to beat our number one player, Terry Smith. All the AHS faculty had a positive influence on me. In the class of 1947, I was only second-best scholastically, being bested by Frank Halden. Nine percent of our class went on to get PhDs, MDs or LLDs. This included me, and I had a successful career as Professor of Physics at the University of Rhode Island. Teaching and research have been a great combination for me. Three cheers for AHS, my inspiration!

landmark. My dad drove to always
improve the community his family was
blessed to be part of and always will

be. This is for Shirley. . . . Wow! I recently was spurred by all the nostalgia regarding the Maid Rite Sandwich Shop which has emerged as a popular favorite laurel. Those who have savored the sandwich crave for the specific burger bite. Many home cooks have tried and failed at recreating this ICON, and there is no reason you can't do it. My name is Harry B. Oates, and I was raised in a family dedicated to make family's eating experiences with outstanding food way back when the town of Ames, Iowa was celebrating its 100th birthday and before. So I decided with the blessing of my 92 year old mother to expose the process for the making of a classic Maid Rite sandwich. There is only one step after I explain the equipment and that is eating one.

First I will describe the griddle which is the soul of the sandwich as you will see, so here it goes.... the secret to the robust hardy flavor of an original Ames, Iowa Maid Rite has absolutely nothing to do with spices at all and in any way. The shape of the deep griddle creating this burger marvel is the answer to all your inquiries which is why you will only attempt but not succeed in replicating the sandwich. Both stores on the east end of Main in Ames, (sold to my dad by my granddad), next to Munn Lumber and Dad's pride and joy, the west end store, were built by his own hands. The griddles in both stores were cast iron (no different than a cast iron skillet you would use to fry chicken) fabricated for frying hamburger. The griddle was approximately three feet long and sixteen inches wide. It was divided in

two sections provided with two gas fired burners located at the lower steeping chamber and one heating the beef to serving temperature. The grill slopes up to the serving portion of the griddle approximately ten inches to a relatively flat skillet heated by its own hotter burner to give the product a hot boost. A customer orders a sandwich that is prepared by drawing steeped meat up the transition while pressing the excess fat from the sandwich and sizzled on the hotter surface as the waitress folded in into a bun, the flavor spoke for itself. We drained copious amounts of fat by using a metal pitcher. The secret was how much fat to drain. Too much meant over-done meat, too little meant a greasy sandwich.

These griddles aged over time just like cast iron skillets do. Imagine the day in and day out seasoning these griddles experienced! These are the reasons you have a hard time replicating my family's legacy. However, you can get close. . . have Maid rite parties where you can cook 2 to 4 pounds of quality beef and add just a half of a spoon of beef bouillon which simulates the intensity of cooking fifteen pounds and enjoy. Yet, recognize you won't duplicate the real thing. The heavy volume and turnover of high quality beef cooked in a unique griddle results in a sandwich I believe is lost in time. We love you for enjoying Maid Rites and hope this clarifies my family's approach to a making of the ICONIC sandwich. I did the best I can in describing a long time tradition. I hope I did it justice.

Ames High School has a tradition of giving great opportunities to advance individual interests for all students. Well respected for outstanding academics and sports, the school's excellent teachers strive to elevate student's talents and abilities in writing, and enabling success in visual and performing arts. Some students further their talents throughout adult years building professional careers and gaining national prominence, but all students can appreciate extending their individual talent into lifelong accomplishments and enjoyment.

From the 1950's, musicians have included an outstanding percussionist, Richard ('Dick') Schory, AHS '50, who demonstrated musical talent and leadership from childhood. His father, Howard Schory, was a professional musician and nurtured young Dick's talents. As a youngster Dick brought neighborhood children together with pots and pans and marched the neighborhood streets. Later, through his Ames High years, he organized the first AHS dance band. A percussionist, Dick played in the high school concert band, marching band and pep band. In January,1951, Schory enlisted in the U.S. Air Force. Assigned to the Strategic Air Command near Omaha, he was a percussionist in the SAC bands. This was a great four year long creative experience as band members often wrote and arranged music. The SAC band performance tours included Chicago where Dick met prominent members of the Chicago Symphony with whom he would study.

At the end of his four year enlistment, Dick returned to Ames and Iowa State University. However, in the Fall of 1954, Dick transferred to Northwestern University in Evanston, Illinois. There he formed the NU Percussion Ensemble which became the "Percussion Pops Orchestra" and began recording at Chicago Symphony Hall. The group attracted the attention of RCA Victor. Dick's unique ensemble produced the very first album recorded in Stereophonic Sound. He developed and directed a 22 piece orchestra of brass instruments and percussion which appeared in cities throughout the nation, giving concerts over a 15 year period. All the while, Dick served as Vice President of the William F. Ludwig Drum Company and traveled the U.S. giving educational seminars and percussion symposiums. In 1969 Dick started his own record label, "Ovation," and has produced over 300 albums and pioneered recording processes. He has earned Grammy nominations for recordings and as "Arranger of the Year." For his multifaceted career accomplishments, Dick has been recognized by the

international Percussion Arts Society and named to the PAS Hall of Fame.

The "Ames Hi Aims High" spirit was exemplified throughout Dick Schory's career, and in the best of AHS values and tradition, he provided assistance by teaching other young students including Garry Edson Malone, AHS '56. Malone, also, played drums with AHS concert and marching bands, and pep band. In 1954, Garry met Dick Schory and began drum lessons. Schory made a strict demand for Garry to learn the rudiments for concert snare drum and essential rhythms for Latin and other music. According to Malone, this was vital training that would lead to success in a variety of local and regional territory bands.

In 1957, Malone, too, enrolled in the military. In 1958-'60 he served as Chief Percussionist for the American Embassy Band in Paris, France, under NATO and the 76th Army Band, Orleans Headquarters. Music was diverse with the band traveling to play for military honors (both French and American) during daytime and many evenings were busy with USO shows, dance band and jazz groups. Upon returning to Ames in 1960, Garry played drums in a jazz quartet at Iowa State University which performed at the 1960 National Collegiate Jazz Festival at Notre Dame University. He is grateful for AHS education and music experiences.

In the 1970's while an Ames resident, Garry and his wife, Barbara, a professional violinist and Suzuki violin pedagogic, began the Ames Octagon Art Center Orchestra with Martha Benson and directed by Dr. Richard Snyder, head of the Scheman Center at ISU. That orchestra became the Central Iowa Symphony. Garry states, "Music was a joyous way to give back to the Ames Community."

In 1984, a new opportunity with a financial publications company prompted their relocation to New England where he succeeded in building substantial business that included charitable planned gift development counsel. In 2001, he was asked to join The State University of New York Systems Administration in Albany to evolve and strengthen the statewide 64 campus foundation's planned giving program for building endowment. Having retired as Interim Vice President for Philanthropy/Alumni Affairs in 2008, the Malone's are now living in New Hampshire, enjoying music. Garry has much gratitude for "the abundance of good" derived from Ames High days!

Working with Guys that didn't like me!

(At the Iowa State Plumbing Shop), by Jonathan Huntress, '62

My father, even though he was a professor and worked with his mind, never saw himself as being above working men. After all, his father was a plumber. My father always thought it was fascinating to know about the different ways people make a living. But I was a stuck up snooty kid, even though I didn't know I was stuck up or snooty. Several of the plumbers knew I was a faculty kid and didn't take to me and would criticize me at every opportunity. One of the most ornery men there wasn't even a plumber. He was a 62 year-old laborer. His name was Lester and he was skinny and wiry and tough. He probably had no education at all. If you took the "F" word away from him he would have lost a least a quarter of his vocabulary. He used the word for everything--people, adjectives, verbs and sometimes the word would make up half of one of his sentences. I was amazed I understood what he was saying. Lester spent a lot of time digging. He even had a welder cut two slots in his favorite spade, so that it would be lighter and the water would run out faster as he was lifting it. I wondered why they had such an old man doing such hard work. One day I found out.

I was told to go with Lester and dig up a sewer line in Pammel Court, the married student housing. After World War II, the GI Bill let former servicemen enroll in school. It was thought that many of them would take advantage of the opportunity and the Universities would have extra large classes for several years, but not much longer than that. Right after the war a great number of Quonset huts became available from the government. They were made from curved ribbed steel roofing riveted together. They look like a Pringles can cut to make a half tube. They were crude, but cheap, and very easy to make, ship and quickly erect using unskilled labor. They ended up all over the world as offices, homes, classrooms, storage units and garages. I am sure everyone over fifty has spent time in them and if you look, you can still find them here and there in older sections of town. At Iowa State, when Pammel Court was put in, they thought it might


have a five to ten year life span and then the W.W. II GI Bill bubble would pass. Sixteen years after the war, Pammel Court was still full. The sewers regularly failed. I think they closed the last of those Quonset huts in the last seventies.


Normally when a sewer pipe broke we would get a backhoe in there to dig the hole, but this sewer line was behind the huts, in the backyard area where the children played and the washing hung on lines. There was no way to get a backhoe in so Lester and I went and were shown where to dig. We had to dig a 10 foot by 10 foot hole down to the sewer line which was buried below the frost line which is five feet down in lowa. Lester started digging with his spade. It had a six inch wide blade and was about eighteen inches long. He buried the spade to its top, then lifted up the dirt and turned it aside. Then he moved back ten inches and did it again. We each had a spade and shovel. The spade left most of the dirt where it was, so after he had turned two lines, it was my turn and I took the shovel and began removing the loose dirt and throwing it outside the soon-to-be hole. Lester watched me for a couple minutes, then he laughed at me and said. "Little Jon, you ain't gonna be any damn good to me at all if you keep going like that! You'll be tired out by coffee break! Here, like this! Use your body like levers!" He showed me how to dig with the absolute minimum of effort. I began watching him closely and he really didn't waste a single move. The spade never went an inch higher than it needed to, and neither did the shovel, which was used for "crumbing." His foot would sink the shovel into the loose dirt, then he slid his left hand down to where the wood handle met the metal blade and using his hand as a fulcrum, with his right hand he pushed down the shovel handle, easily levering the dirt out of the hole. He used his arms like a mechanical shovel with an absolute minimum of lifting. When I finished crumbing we had cleared the space ten feet by ten feet to a depth of about one foot.


Now this was heavy lowa soil, mostly black with a few rocks and just a little

bit of clay. The spade broke up the dirt, the shovel took it out of the hole. We repeated what we did four more times and we exposed the broken sewer line before noon. After we dug the first foot down, Lester carefully cut a stairway into the soil on one side so that we, and the plumbers who came after us, could easily get into and out of the hole. I was very impressed. I was also very tired, but Lester was not. Sixty years old and a better digger than I could ever be! But after that, I was good enough for him and he would ask for me and that meant a lot although at the time I wondered why because it also probably meant a really hard day of work.

It has been more than fifty years since I dug the hole with Lester and not a month goes by without me thinking of him at some point. Belligerent, old, tough and cursing more often than not, I remember him. I cannot say that about any other teacher I had in high school or college. There are classes and teachers and there is life and learning and I think we seldom know who the most effective teachers of life are. If you just spend a quiet moment of reflection they will quickly come to mind. And, some of

From the AHSAA Archives...

1957... Sixty years ago... Tuesday through Friday the members of the Ames High concert band, under the direction of Richard Day, practiced diligently. Their performances included two assemblies, the annual concert, and the Tri-City Festival in Webster City. This year five members of the band-Jon Piersol, Kay Zickefoose, Katy Reed, Charmain Baker and Dave Shrader--made the all-state band. The marching band performed at all home football games, at Sioux city and in the Veishea Parade. The pep band played for assemblies and home basketball games. The swing band played for Career Day, Teen Time Talent Show, and some high school parties.

The Ames High orchestra, under the direction of Douglas Engelhardt, was host for the Tri-City Orchestra Festival on March 5. Their performances also included their annual concert, an assembly and for U. N. Day. The pit orchestra played for all the plays. Eleven members of the orchestra-Don Martin, Judy Simpson, Nancy Anderson, Sue Englehorn, Bill Henderson, Tom Timm, Tessie Pappas, Sue Hetzel, Sally Howard, Margaret Shrader and Ilene Wardle--made the all-state orchestra.

1967... Fifty years ago... During the first semester, until the new gymnasium reached completion, few assemblies were held. These assemblies included pep assemblies, the election assembly, and the State Department assembly which was special because Ames High was one of the few schools in the state to have this presentation. Two awards assemblies

were held in the spring--one to honor athletes and the other to honor academics. Assemblies were student planned by the Assembly Committee composed of a chairman from Student Council and members chosen at-large from the student body.

In spite of the blizzard that came to town on December 28, a large crowd turned out for the annual Christmas Formal. Couples began the evening's agenda by attending various "coketail" parties and then arrived at


