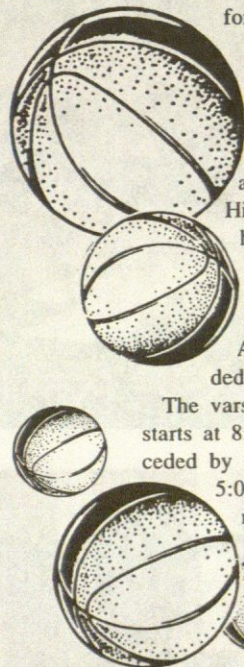
The Greens In Orange And Black

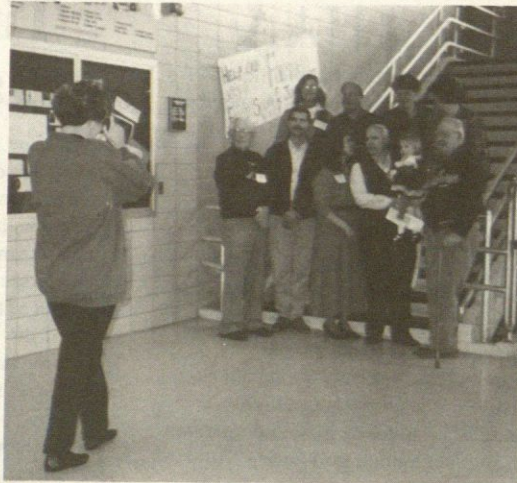

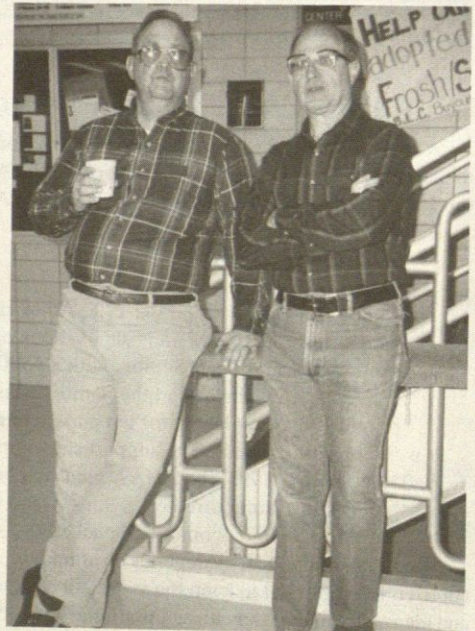

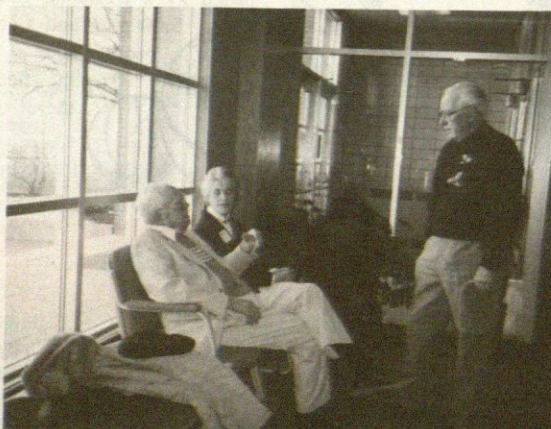

(The newsletter staff received requests to print excerpts from the Web, Ames High's newspaper. The following is from a recent Web.)

What lies ahead: Students face fears of the future.

Life after high school leaves a lot of possibilities for one to consider. With those may come fear or anxiety of what the future holds.

A common fear amongst many Ames High students revolves around finding a career. "I'm scared of finding a job I'll be happy in. Not like all that money and success, but personal success," said junior Sara Meinhard.

"[I'm fearful of] where the world's going to go in the future-our country might go to pot. It's time for a good depression, I'd say we're about up for one," stated senior Shawn Kliebenstein. "I'm scared of not getting a job when I'm done with college because there might not be any market out there. I'm not really scared, I guess, I'm overwhelmed."


Senior Greg Elwick is afraid of the continual growth of AIDS. "I'm scared for both everybody and myself, because somehow I'm sure it will affect my friends or family relations," Elwick said.

Other students often ponder who they will walk with down the aisle. "I get nervous when I think about getting married. I have gone out with people, but I don't know if I'll ever find the right person," said senior Jay Clark.

While these students worry about fears in this life, junior Annagreta Birch fears the afterlife. "I'm scared of dying. Once you're dead, you never know what's going to come next. You don't know what's going to happen to you. Maybe God won't think I'm good enough to go to heaven," Birch said.

Death is a certainty in future events not just for yourself but for those around you, and it still causes fear. "I'm scared of when my grandparents and parents die. When they die it'll be so different because I can tell them anything and they listen with their hearts. You can tell they love you so much," said Elwick.


The world beyond high school may lie a few years or only a few months away, but it will come, along with those fears of the future.

Scratch Pad board members announced

Scratch Pad, Ames High's literary magazine, is gearing up for its 1993 edition with the announcement of the board members. The board selections were made before winter break by the co-editors, seniors Erin Hoffmann and Terrill Johnston, and adviser Kirk Daddow.

They have chosen Margie Mayfield as art editor and an editorial board that consists of 13 members: seniors Carlos Wesley, Avanti Athreya, Valerie Reed, Adienne van der Valk; juniors Laura David, Cassie Dunham, Amy Poague, and Lizz Welch; sophomores Aprille Clark, Ruby Hsu, and Katie Woods; and freshmen Chris Meyer and Abbe Shaprio.

With this year's *Scratch Pad*, the staff is trying to change by getting more student involvement. "We're trying to reform our reputation; we want to publish more people and get more students interested in *Scratch Pad* this year," said Hoffmann.

"If there are *Scratch Pad* submission boxes in every classroom, I feel that when people get papers back in class they may just drop them in the box as a submission," Hoffmann said.

Right now it's possible to submit writing to *Scratch Pad* through the box in the media center and through the box in the English office, Room 205.

Scratch Pad will accept any piece and board members will rate it to determine its printability based on different areas: organization, style, and content. However, according to Hoffmann, none of the entries will be rejected because of controversial viewpoints, since all writings are personal views of the writers.

"Due to the great difference of opinion of the board members, there is always discussions about the pieces," Hoffmann said.

Changing leadership Ames High's Farrar becomes assistant superintendent

Ames High School Principal Ralph Farrar will become the school district's new assistant superintendent, leaving Ames High School after 24 years as principal.

Farrar, 58, will replace Luther Kiser, who will retire this fall. The promotion will take effect July 1.

"It's kind of a personal goal that I've had all my professional life," Farrar said of his promotion. "It's an opportunity to be in the central office." Farrar said he decided several years ago that he liked Ames so much that he would rather stay there than seek a job in a small district as a superintendent. Farrar, who came to Ames in July 1969, has spent the past 35 years as either a principal or assistant high school principal in Nebraska and Iowa schools.

Leaving Ames High School won't be easy, he said.

"You spend 24 years of your professional life in this educational setting, you leave it with a lot of regrets and sorrow," he said. "But I'm really happy to have this opportunity to work in the central office."

Farrar said it will be strange not to spend every day among crowds of teenagers.

"I will really miss the association and friends that I have among the student body - it's just a lot of fun to work with our young people," he said. "I will miss that a great deal."

But Farrar added it will be nice to enjoy the students' accomplishments without having to directly supervise and discipline them.

Superintendent Ron Rice said he tapped Farrar for the job because of his knowledge of the Ames community and his strong secondary school background.

"We're delighted to have somebody with Ralph's background in the central office," Rice said. "Ralph and I have talked about this a number of years and it was a mutual agreement. I certainly saw him as meeting all of our primary criteria."

Rice said a national search for Farrar's replacement involving "broad staff, community and student input" will begin immediately. More than 100 applications are expected, he said.

Applications for the job will be accepted until March 5 and final candidates will be selected March 18. Final interviews will be conducted March 22-25, followed by visits to their home districts with the superintendent's recommendation to the school board set for April 5.

School Board president Howard Shapiro said the changes will have a lasting impact on the school district.

"These are big changes," he said. "And we'll move ahead."

Rice agreed with Shapiro.

"Over the past 50 years, there have been two principals at Ames High," Rice said. "It's going to be quite a change for the district to look at a new high school principal - it only happens every 25 years or so. It's quite an event."

For Whom It Is Named

There is a publication available from Iowa State that lists all halls, buildings, streets and other facilities that were named for people connected with Iowa State University. Perusal of this document reveals that many of these facilities were named after parents of Ames High graduates. Two are even named after Ames High graduates. What follows here is a listing showing the name of the building, for whom it is named and the Ames High graduates that were related.

The **Durham Center** is named for Charles W. Durham and Margre Henningson Durham, both 1939 graduates of ISU. Mr. Durham was a 1935 graduate of Ames High. Their \$3 million was the key contribution for the Computation Center. Our data base is stored there. The Durhams still live in Omaha. The **Margaret Sloss Women's Center** is housed in Sloss House. Margaret Sloss was a 1919 AHS graduate. The house is named for her father Tom Sloss. There were three others in her family who were AHS graduates. Grace Sloss Nissen '14, Tom Sloss, Jr. '16 and Martha Sloss Howard '26.

Three facilities are named for people who are still living. These three people still live in Ames and are somewhat legendary now. **Lagomarcino Hall** is named for Virgil Lagomarcino and houses the Education College. Virgil probably gave more high school commencement addresses than any man in Ames. His children are Mary Lagomarcino Anderson '68, Mark Lagomarcino '74 and Martha Lagomarcino Gleason '76. Harley Wilhelm gave **Wilhelm Hall** its name. Harley was part of the team that worked for Frank Spedding when uranium was produced for the first atomic bomb. He's still spry and witty, at 92, and plays the accordion. His children are Lorna Wilhelm Livingston '44, Max Wilhelm '46, Myrna Wilhelm Elliot '47 and Gretchen Wilhelm '56. J.C. Shorty Schilleter gave **Schilleter Village** its name. His daughter is Sugar Schilleter Mark '55.

Beardshear Hall was named for William N. Beardshear, an ISU president. His children were William Beardshear '06, Charles Beardshear '07 and Constance Beardshear Moye '11. Samuel W. Beyer, the father of Iowa State athletics, is the reason for **Beyer Hall**. His daughters are Jeanette Beyer McCoy '19 and Mary Beyer Sumner '27. **Black Engineering Building** is named for Henry M. Black. His two children are Bruce Black '55 and Bernice Black Durand '60. Mr. Black was head of the mechanical engineering department for 26 years. The building was com-

pleted in 1986. The graduate student residence hall, **Buchanan Hall**, opened in 1964 at the corner of Lincoln Way and Ash. Joseph Buchanan's '30 father, Robert E. Buchanan has the honor of having his name on it. Mr. Buchanan served as the first graduate dean for thirty years.

Merv Coover '37, George Coover '39 and Martha Coover Anderson '44 are the children of Mervyn S. Coover. **Coover Hall**, the Electrical Engineering Building bears Mr. Coover's name. **Curtiss Hall** is one of the older buildings on campus. Charles F. Curtiss' three daughters were Ruth Curtiss Murray '11, Edith Curtiss Shugart '13 and Helen Curtiss Whittaker '17. Margaret Davidson '25 and Ethel Davidson Eaton '27 are J. Brownlee Davidson's daughters. **Davidson Hall**, the ag engineering lab, is named for him. Charles E. Friley had a son and a daughter at Ames High. They were William Friley '34 and Frances Friley Kuyper '42. You can guess which residence hall is named for Mr. Friley.

In 1973 the **Chemistry Hall** was renamed Gilman Hall in honor of Henry Gilman. His two children are Jane Gilman Liebich '49 and Henry Gilman '52. **Hamilton Hall** houses the Department of Journalism and Mass Communication as well as the Iowa State Daily. The building bears Carl Hamilton's name. His children are Bruce Hamilton '64 and Mark Hamilton '67. Earl O. Heady was known world wide for his work with ag economics. The building that now houses the economics department is named for him. Marilyn Heady Kling '62, Stephen Heady '64 and Barbara Heady '68 are his children.

Helser Hall was opened in 1957 and now stands where the Iowa State baseball field was located. Maurice D. Helser had two daughters who graduated from AHS, Jane Helser Bliss '35 and Margaret Helser Desonier '40. Mr. Helser was dean of Iowa State's junior college from the 30s until 1955. **Kildee Hall** opened in 1965 and was named in honor of Herbert H. Kildee. He served the agricultural department from 1918 to 1949. His daughters are Regina Kildee Adams '30 and Kathleen Kildee Minard '39. **Lush Auditorium** is located in Kildee Hall. It bears Jay L. Lush's name. His wife, Adeline Lush taught at Ames High. His two children, David Lush and Mary Lush Hausrath, graduated from AHS in 1942.

Anson Day Marston was on the engineering staff from 1892 to 1932, the last twenty eight as head. His son's were Morrill Marston '13 and Anson Day Marston Jr. '21. Marston was completed in 1903. The **William Robert**

Parks and Ellen Sorge Parks Library was dedicated in 1984. Dr. and Mrs. Parks still live in Ames. Their daughters are Andrea Parks Van Houweling '61 and Cynthia Parks Hamilton '72. **Ross Hall**, just north of Curtiss Hall was named for Earle D. Ross, professor of history for 36 years. His children are Ronald Ross '39, Bruce Ross '43 and Betsy Ross Bayha '46. James G. Snedecor '35 is the son of George W. Snedecor. Dr. Snedecor developed the first statistics course offered at Iowa State in 1915. **Snedecor Hall** is named for him.

Frank Spedding was one of America's leading atomic scientists. Elizabeth Spedding Calciano '57 is his daughter. **Spedding Hall** was opened in 1951 and was named for the first director of the Ames Lab. Orland Russell Sweeney is holder of nearly 300 patents and was head of Iowa State's chemical engineering department for 28 years. His daughters are Elizabeth Sweeney Jester '38 and Jacqueline Sweeney Klass '48. Iowa State tore up the relocated baseball diamond south of the Iowa State cemetery and replaced it with the **Town Engineering Building**. It's named for George R. Town, father of Anne Town '52. The baseball diamond has had at least four locations at Iowa State and perhaps is located for good at the southeast intersection of Knapp and Sheldon. It's called **Cap Timm Field**. Cap's wife was Tippy Briley Timm '28. Their children are Tommy Timm '59 and Susanne Timm Bohacek '63.

Two of the more famous Iowa State landmarks are **Pammel court** and the Edgar W. and Margaret McDonald Stanton Memorial Carillon. The latter is the official title for the Campanile. Louis H. Pammel had five children graduate from Ames High. They were Edna Pammel Needham '06, Doris Pammel '10, Lois Pammel Blundell '12, Violet Pammel '13 and Harold Pammel '16. Dr Pammel served the botany department for 42 years. **The Campanile** is currently undergoing a complete renovation. The Stantons had a daughter, Margaret Stanton Kirchman '98. Mr. Stanton built the campanile as a memorial to his wife. He had another daughter who graduated from Ames High in 1921, Barbara Stanton Spitzmiller.

The booklet, "For Whom It Is Named", lists many other facilities, Ames streets and residence hall houses that are named for Iowa State personnel with Ames High connections. We'll save that for a later newsletter.

Farwell Brown

Farwell Brown '29 has a new book coming out soon. "Ames, Iowa: From Marshland to Modern City in Word and Picture" is being published locally by Heuss Printing. It includes 55 stories about Ames plus appendices and a time line. Price and retail sale outlets were not finalized at press time.


This endeavor is just one more in the continuing saga of Farwell Brown, Ames' historiographer. Brown has committed uncounted hours to preserving the history of Ames in photographs and oral histories he has collected. In 1990 the Ames Public Library Board of Trustees honored him with their first award after he donated 2700 photo negatives from his collection to the library for future generations. He also provided all his working papers and significant newspaper clippings collected about Ames' 125 year history.

A lifelong Ames resident, Brown worked with a librarian to organize the pictures and set up a filing system to give the public easier access to the information.

As historiographer, Brown is the "source" when you want to know more information about Ames. He knows what businesses used to operate where, who owned them and tidbits about early Ames families' lives as well as lots of trivia.

Farwell's contribution is expected to serve historians as well as citizens. It might well be used in researching American history for the region.

Brown has also contributed a huge Partners Desk (a desk with drawers on both sides so two people can use it at the same time) which sits in the community Room on the library's second floor.

Mini-Grants Awarded by Foundation

The Ames Education Foundation has again awarded mini-grants of up to \$500 to teachers for imaginative programs that directly benefit students. This year \$6,000 was awarded to 15 projects. Thirty five requests for funding were received from teachers throughout the Ames School District. A total of over \$23,000 has been awarded through the Foundation's mini-grant program.

The goal of the Foundation is to provide financial support for innovative educational projects not ordinarily provided through the district's operating budget. The financial support comes from supporters of the Ames schools and includes funds for technology and learning, scholastic enrichment, arts and education, business partnerships and an endowment fund. A volunteer board of trustees governs the Foundation and is responsible for selecting projects and awarding funds. The Foundation's board of trustees is independent of the school board.
