



As in the first issue, all AHS graduates (now 21,171) are listed in alphabetical order, in order by graduation class and in order by geographical location. Even deceased graduates are included with the date and place of death, if known. This issue covers the classes from 1878 through 2000. An alphabetical listing of faculty is also included.

New with this issue is 52 pages of pictures from Spirits beginning in 1920. There are two to three pictures from

every year! There are also many lists included in the directory such as Homecoming Kings/Queens, Presidential Scholars, Athletic Hall-of-Fame members, AHSAA Distinguished Alumni, AHSAA Scholarship winners and more.



Alumni Still Aiming High

Mary (Pierre) Morrisett '48 was chosen to receive the third annual Adele M. Warnock Good Citizenship Award in recognition of her role in developing a new public library in Irvington, NY. Over an eight-year period, she led the charge to restore a building to house the library, raising \$1,400,000 for construction costs.

Jim Lamson '54 is retiring after being the Des Moines Valley High School drama teacher after 30 years. Along with his wife Cindy, they directed more than 70 shows together. The Lamsons said the past 30 years have gone by quickly, and they never got tired of working together.

Kathryn (Burnet) Andre '65 was named one of Ames' Unsung Heroes. She was nominated for her volunteer work in a number of different areas in the community - from Heartland Senior Services to the Iowa State Honors program, from mentoring programs for women in science and engineering and "housemother" at Alpha Delta Phi to an advocate for the arts, she always steps forward to help. And they dry them all with care They put them back where they belong


They all seem to want to share.

Book Designed to Record Children's Words



LuAnn (Forssman) Van Weelden '86, along with her sister Holly (Forssman) Lyles '92 have written "Listen to your Children", a book to stimulate and provide a spot to record children's words.

"Parents, grandparents and teachers have all heard the wonderful things kids say," said Van Weelden. "This book provides you with encouragement and space to write down all those word pictures and wise thoughts your children say."

Around the borders of the paperback book, filled with pages to write down those clever words and moments, as well as story-starter ideas, is the quote: "Life is largely a matter of paying attention."

Lyles said listening to what children are saying is an important aspect of raising them. "There are everyday moments, carseat moments and sandbox moments," she said, adding that children share so many life-enriching words. "How many times have you said to yourself, 'Oh, I should write that down'?"

The book stems from Van Weelden's and Lyles' own childhood when their parents, John and Sharon, wrote down the clever and cute words the two had used. The authors said the record would be a treasure for parents, grandparents and children to

look back on those early developmental years.

Lyles, a third-grade teacher in Norwalk, said it is important to value children's words. Van Weelden, a fifth-grade teacher in Ankeny, agreed the book was inspired by the students who they have had to carefully listen to throughout the years.

Van Weelden added that psychologists remind parents constantly to listen to their children because "over time they tell their parents what they need to know to raise them as they reveal daily who they are in their own words."

"Listen to Your Children" is available for around \$13 at area bookstores in Ames, Des Moines and the Twin Cities.

AHS introduces automated phone system

This fall, Ames High School parents may answer their phones to find a recorded message notifying them their child is not in school or inviting them to an open house. The school has begun using an automated phone calling system called School Messenger. Ames High Principal Mike McGrory said the messenger is one component of a larger goal. "We've put a real emphasis on communication and any way we can improve or enhance the communication system," McGrory said.

At an Ames School Board meeting, John Forssman read the inscription on the plaque that now hangs in the media center. Bruce Vertanen will succeed Jim Burrow as head football coach at Ames High. He served as defensive coordinator for nine seasons under Burrow and former coach Kirk Daddow. He also has been the Little Cyclones' head girls' basketball coach for 12 seasons and an assistant boys' track coach. Vertanen will give up the girls' basketball position, something he says he will miss, but plans to continue as a track assistant. He believes strongly in the Ames tradition of multi-sport participation and hopes to act as an example for Ames athletes.

The lifetime of a marching band uniform is usually 10 to 12 years. That is, if the uniforms are used for just the marching band. Our uniforms (at least the pants) are also used for concert performances during the school year. This amount of usage puts a lot of wear (and yes, tear) on those uniforms.

We will be asking alumni and the Ames community to play a role in this project by making financial contributions. It is an exciting time for the Marching Band, and we hope you will be a part of this very important project.

Our goal is to once again have our Ames High School Marching Band members showing off new uniforms at the 2002 VEISHEA parade! Won't you please join the band and *Be Instrumental* in our efforts?

Their final presentations, in Power Point, video and/or story board, gave them an opportunity to experience what it would be like to promote their invention to a real company.

The objectives of the curriculum are to introduce students to an effective method of thinking and making decisions and to excite them about a bright future as an entrepreneur. Cal, who is now working to sell the TRIZ curriculum to school districts throughout the country, is asking if local Ames patrons would sponsor the project for the Ames Middle School. The curriculum, including the workshop, staff development training, product evaluation, and student feedback, will cost \$5,000 to repeat this year.

Eight of last year's participants recently formed a new business in Ames, Swivel Ideas, LLC, to develop and sell their products to manufacturers.
